Like many Camp Billings alumni, my life was touched by Larry Drew. When I was a teenager, he was a formidable leader always with a sharpened pencil in hand to neatly write down names of volunteers to help around camp. He made me want to raise my hand so that my name would be on his lists.

Larry was the embodiment of our camp's motto and over and over he taught us that "anything worth doing at all, is worth doing well." He taught me the expert way to plunge the toilets on girls senior row, and he also taught me how to paint properly to avoid dripping. Larry liked to have fun. His voice boomed the loudest in the dining hall when we sang some of his favorites from the songbook, like "run along home Cindy Cindy...I'll marry you some day!" among others. And he shared his joy for dance with countless generations who hoped for the honor of dancing a polka with Larry, breathlessly trying to keep up.

After his dear friend Ralph Lawrence retired as director, he continued to serve camp alongside the Freitases and then Bob Green, all while sharing his wise advice to the board of directors. His commitment and love for Billings was unparalleled. All this time, Larry continued to act as a bridge between the local community and the campers and counselors who parachute in every summer from every corner of Vermont, New England, and all over the world. The round the lake race is his



legacy and embodies so much of what what Larry was about: volunteering, challenging yourself, being fit, building community and having fun. It is thus very fitting that the Billings alumni and surrounding community will honor his memory this summer at camp after the race. Join us on Saturday, July 27th at 9:30 sharp!

Lawrence E. "Larry" Drew - 85 years - December 15, 1932 -December 2, 2018

I had the pleasure of knowing Larry as a camper, then working with him as staff member and finally as a Board member. He was my coach, along with Bobby Green when we had a baseball team back in 1973. He was always so enthusiastic and a great mentor to us all. Then back in 1979 when I decided too late to come back to camp on staff, the only position open was a Maintenance Assistant, so I took it and I wasn't all that good at it! But Larry never gave me any grief, and instead took me along with him and showed me the ropes and I actually became pretty good at fixing broken screens and porch steps. I joined the Board in 2004 and have worked with him ever since. Larry brought to the Board an important voice whenever we had questions about camp's electric, plumbing, septic, well water and infrastructure. He was always the one we turned to.

Larry worked for Billings for 47 years and was the Assistant Director for many of those, and was always involved with Athletics, but for me, he will always be remembered as the one and only Head of Maintenance.

Outside of camp, Larry had a lengthy career as an educator teaching math, receiving his BS and MA from St. Michael's College in Winooski, VT in 1957. He eventually retired from Thetford Academy where he was a beloved coach of basketball, skiing, cross country and track and field. I'd like to personally thank his wife Margaret of 60 years, for always letting Larry come back to camp each summer! I had many fun summers with their kids, Ed, Sarah and Megan. Larry was also very active in his town of Bradford VT where he served on the Bradford Town Planning and the Water-Sewer Department as well as a communicant of Our Lady of Perpetual Help Church.

Larry will also be remembered for his boisterous announcements in the Dining Hall and his love for Square Dancing, but it was his love for running that he brought to camp his famous annual Race Around The Lake. This year just happens to be its 50th Anniversary and we will be a having a Memorial Service for Larry on campus after the race is complete. Not being a runner at all, I found



this race to be quite a challenge and I finally ran it my last summer on staff...and thanks to one of my best friends Chip Henderson who forced me out on a few practice runs. To this day I always remember how proud I was to have completed the 10K and in just under an hour at 59 minutes! Myself along with thousands of other campers and staff have Larry to thank for this. I'm looking forward to running it again this summer. How many of us have collected those coveted Race Around The Lake T Shirts, a new one generated each year, that several of my camp friends have even made quilts out of them! One of the best T Shirts honoring Larry was one of the last and it said:

"Race Around The Lake, Larry Drew. The Man The Myth The Legend. Thanks Larry for all you have done for our beloved Camp Billings."

Dear Larry Drew, Uncle Larry, Lare-bear

Dear Larry:

I am not quite sure who first convinced me to run around Lake Fairlee in 1992. Maybe I felt pressured by my friends in Cabin 7 who all seemed to think that we would complete the 10 kilometer course in just under twenty minutes and be back in time for a few rounds of tether-ball before lunch (conveniently, none of us knew the length of a kilometer, nor did our Canadian peers choose to tell us); maybe my counselors, Paul Behar and Sean Kiley, informed us that we wouldn't get lunch or dinner if we didn't all leave the cabin and run; or maybe I simply enjoyed the hype leading up to the event and came to appreciate the race as a rite of passage. But memory has a way of acting upon us in strange ways, and I have always chosen to believe that you convinced me to run. After all, it was *your* race.

Years later, I returned to Billings as a CIT, and you inadvertently found another way to challenge my relationship to the race. Each year, you would bring one or two of your Thetford Academy runners to "help out in maintenance," but we all knew that you just wanted to keep them honest with their summer training. Thanks to you, I met John Milanese that summer, one of your best runners of all time, and still one of my best friends to this day. We logged about fifty miles a week together through the back ridges of Vermont, sometimes with you following us in your truck to make sure that we weren't slacking off. John would finish first overall that year, and I would finish fourth. You made sure to tell me that my form was crap and that I was the stiffest runner you had ever seen.

In 2004, the Friday before the race, after you, Casey Huling and I had spent the day pretending to fix things around camp but mostly just telling each other inappropriate jokes while sitting in the 9 to 5 shop, you invited us to hop in your truck and go for a drive around the lake. You said that you "needed help with the mile-markers," yet we learned quickly that you didn't need the help; you wanted the company. Around mile marker three, you said the competition had gotten soft. The race times were nothing like they used to be back in your day. You reminded me that if I chose to run, I should relax my arms and I better not be wearing some stupid costume. It's a race, after all, you said.

You came back in 2017 to watch your last race. This time, we drove you. You wanted to sit at the bottom of Quinibeck because you always said that you could tell who was going to win the race that year based on how confidently they were running down that hill just before hitting the 4-mile marker at the intersection of 244. I chose to run that year, partly because I felt strong, but mostly because I knew you would be watching. I wanted to bring something full-circle even if I didn't know exactly what that thing was or if I would manage to do it. As I ran down Quinibeck, I intentionally relaxed my arms, brought my elbows in, and lengthened my stride. I felt as if I had finally lived into the form toward which we had been working for so many years. As I turned on to 244, we locked eyes for just a moment, and I saw you smile. You may have been thinking that



my form had finally improved and that I was well positioned to do well in the race, but something in me will always rather believe that you were smiling because you knew damn well that if you had been running, you would have "whooped" me and you would have been waiting at the finish line to tell me another inappropriate joke.

We'll all keep running, so long as you keep watching.

After exchanging Christmas cards for years with the Houles (JoDee, Larry and their son Jessy) Jennifer and I figured out that we both go to the same area of Florida to escape winter.

On January 14th we got together in Florida to share stories and memories from our time working at Camp Billings in the 1980s. I am always curious about a person's first impression camp. The Houles shared their story of their first day at CB. The Houles arrived at camp in first week of June, 1983 after driving across the country from northern Wisconsin. JoDee was in charge of the Dining Room/Dish Room, Larry the head of maintenance. As they pulled into camp with very little gas in their truck and little money in their pocket they notice a very "rough" looking camp. Additionally they saw their living accommodations..... "Cabin in the Woods" which was across the street where the current Rain Shadow field is located. Back in the 1980s that was all woods and swamp. It was very dilapidated building hidden in the thick brush with broken windows, mice and spiders everywhere. Behind the cabin was the "BB's shed" and beyond that the "22 rifle range." JoDee and Larry thought that they had made a big mistake. Then Uncle Ralph came out of the office and walked across the Clock Tower lawn and immediately Jessy, who was 7 years old, went running at full steam at him and hugged Uncle Ralph around his legs....at that moment they knew it would be ok. No matter what camp looks like it truly is the people that make it a special place. Hard to believe how clear the memories are after 35 years!




He was one of a kind. A real force of nature. He was one of the reasons Camp Billings is so special. -Jeanne Arbuckle




Balloon Fest!

For the fifth year running, the Post Mills Airport hosted an **Experimental Airship** Meet - or a Balloon Fest for the rest of us - in mid May. More than a thousand people came to mingle with balloonists and watch the amazing spectacle of dozens of hot air balloons as they lifted off into the sky.
